Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

A handsome utilitarian brick building with Colonial Revival accents, this structure, one of Concord center's most sensitive commercial adaptations, contributes to the early-twentieth-century flavor of much of lower Walden Street. It is a two-story flat-roofed square building typical of fire stations of its era, originally built with garage space for the fire apparatus on the first floor, and rooms for the fire department personnel on the second.

Today the first story storefront has large multi-light glass-and-panel entries that are very similar to the two double-leaf garage doors that once nearly filled the facade. The original Federal Revival flaned, keystoned brick and sandstone door lintels remain, now with a long wooden molding/sign board below. Although the roof parapet is gone, its dentilated cornice is still intact, as are a second molded course across the facade above the second story, and brick quoining at the facade corners. The first story side windows have been bricked up; the second story windows are primarily 6-over-6-sash, tripartite on the side elevations, and grouped on the facade as a triple flanked by two double windows. Sandstone keystones appear again in the flared brick lintels of the side windows.

The Central Fire Station was constructed by the town in 1904 as a new larger fire house for all the fire apparatus for the town center. It replaced two older facilities, Engine House #1 (still standing today at #9-11 Independence Court), and an 1893 hose house on the east side of Thoreau Street between Sudbury and Middle Streets. Stalls for the fire department horses were located in a separate building at the rear of the property.

Beginning in 1914, for many years the fire department had only one permanent employee, (the first was Roy Bass,) and the main force consisted of twenty volunteer "call men." The town purchased its first piece of motorized equipment in 1910.

In the middle of this century the town built a combined fire and police station further south on Walden Street just outside the town center, and #22-28 was sold for private development. Among its present tenants are a restaurant, liquor store, and hairdresser.

To make way for this building, a ca. 1870 house formerly belonging to George Brabrook was moved back to face Hubbard Street, where it was the first house on the street for many years. It was later torn down to make way for the post office.
