ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Like many of Concord's farmhouses, #23 Garfield Road is composed of two houses from two different periods. In the rear section, (possibly including part of the long line of sheds that stretches to the south,) is an old farmhouse that pre-dates 1830. It was moved from across the street in the early 1870's, at which time the 2 1/2-story, twin-end-chimney house was added onto the front of it. The 1870's house is generally Italianate in proportions, but has very little detail that could be identified with any style. It is three bays wide, and stands on a brick foundation. The windows are large 6-over-6-sash with projecting crowns (4/4's are located under the gables at the attic story). The main entry, more Greek Revival thatn Italianate, has a 6-panel door, divided transon, and a simple surround with full-length sidelights. The roof eaves are unboxed, and instead of cornerboards, the house corners are trimmed with a 3/4 round molding—a feature found on only a few houses in Concord.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

This house is significant for its long connection with the Garfield family, who owned considerable farmland in the vicinity, and for whom Garfield Road is named. It began as a smaller, pre-1830 house on a site directly across the road. The first owner was evidently farmer Daniel Garfield. In the early 1870's the old house was moved to the east side of the street, and the main 2 1/2-story house seen today was built in front of it. The property belonged to Daniel Garfield's descendants until about 1880, when it was acquired by farmer Henry Derby. He lived here through the beginning of this century; his son, Henry Derby, Jr., was here until at least 1925. The map of 1906 clearly shows his large barn, which stood close to the road south of the house until it was destroyed in the 1938 hurricane.
