Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

As one of the town's few Gothic Revival houses, 23 Lexington Road is a rare building in Concord. It is absolutely unique, in fact, in its interpretation of the style in granite block. Its builder and first owner was a stonemason, Cyrus Pierce, who undoubtedly used the building, as well as its distinctive Gothic-Revival stone and cast-iron fence, as a showcase for his talents. The main house is a two-story stone building with its gable-end to the street. Its main entry is in the west side, under a long porch that connects to a somewhat later one-story, flat-roofed, flushboarded ell at the rear north corner. A flat-roofed, rectangular bay, also flushboarded, extends east from the southeast front house corner, and a gable-roofed one-story wood-frame ell extends to the rear. A pair of tall brick chimneys, one on either side of the ridge, rises from the slate roof of the main house.

The stone walls of the main part of the house are random-laid, flat ashlar. Their corners are articulated by wide granite-block corner pilasters with flat plinth-like capitals topped with a flat, projecting piece of stone resembling a cornice return. Granite is also used in a wide-block frieze along upper edge of the side walls, and in the sills and lintels of the windows. The roof line is marked by a wide, wooden cove frieze, overhanging, unboxed eaves, and saw-cut verge boards in a fleur-de-lys design. Cont.)

This house, built in 1850, was connected with the Pierce family for over a hundred years. It was built by stone-mason and former shoemaker Cyrus Pierce, who had previously lived with his family above the store that had stood on the site of the Town House. The house occupies the site of the blacksmith shop of Benjamin Barrett, which was built here in about 1730. The stonemasonry of Cyrus Pierce is still visible at many locations in Concord. He often did work for the town--in 1850 he moved and reset the stone posts of the "New" Burying Ground (part of Sleepy Hollow Cemetery); in 1855 he repaired one of the town bridges and relaid the wall of the Hill Burying Ground adjacent to his house. He also carved the family monument in Sleepy Hollow Cemetery. He owned several pieces of real estate, including a half-interest in the "Yellow Block" across the street. (See Forms 321 and 322.)

Cyrus married Susan Ann Parks; for a time her mother, also Susan Ann Parks, lived in the added north corner ell, which was known by the family as "Grandma's part". Of the Pierce's ten children, sons Frank and Arthur lived in the house for a time as adults. They had a shoe-shop on the Milldam in the Milldam Co. Building at #36-40 (see Form #11.) Arthur moved to Hopkinton, where he opened another shoe store with their brother Alfred, and later relocated to Fitchburg. Frank, who had moved to Hubbard Street by 1886, carried on the store on the Milldam for over fifty years. Of the daughters, Ella Pierce and her husband Milo Stearns, who may have lived here from the time of their marriage, bought the house after Mrs. Pierce, who had survived her husband by many years, died. ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION, cont.

The main entry has a large-light, glass-and-panel door surrounded by full-length, diamond-pane sidelights and transom. The main facade facing Lexington Road has three windows at the first story, two at the second, and another pair in the south bay. All are double-hung, with diamond-paned sash and louvered wood shutters. Both the south bay and northwest ell are clad in wood flushboard, with quoined corners, and elaborate paired brackets at the cornice line. An entry in the facade of the northwest ell has a large-light, glass-and-panel door similar to the main one. Extending along the northwest side of the house is an elaborate porch with a marble floor. Its posts are of open construction with flared braces at the top. The cornice of the porch, like the ell and bay, is embellished with paired brackets.

In addition to the fence, a stone fountain, decorated with conch shells, that stands in the side yard, may have been constructed by Cyrus Pierce.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE, cont.

Milo Stearns worked at the Concord Reformatory, and Ella Stearns worked for the U.S. Government in Pepperell. Mr. Stearns became an invalid for several years before he died, and during that time another Pierce daughter, Ida Pierce Goff, and her husband Frank, lived in the house. Mrs. Stearns owned the property until her death in about 1937; the next owner was apparently Ida Goff, who died in 1941.

Another Pierce daughter, Eliza, married George Heywood of 105 Lexington Road. (See Form #313.) Of all the Pierce children, Arthur lived the longest, and some years before his death in 1961 at the age of 98, he recalled for a newspaper article his days as a young man and boy in Concord. He recounted his memories of President Grant's visit in 1875, of Emerson tucking the stub of his cigar into the Pierce's front fence, and of posing for Daniel Chester French when he executed his sculpture of William Lloyd Garrison.
