

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Apparently constructed at the close of the nineteenth century, with one wing possibly added several years later, this house continues the "upright-and-wing" configuration that had become popular in the residential sections of West Concord by the mid-1870's. It is a tall two-story cross-gabled house, with a molded, boxed cornice and two-over-two-sash windows with molded frames. The main entry, located on the north side facing Old Mill Road, contains what is apparently an early twentieth century glass-and-panel door, with four lights in the top half.

Old Mill Road did not become an official public way until 1942. For many years this building was a relatively isolated farmhouse, the only house on several acres of open land off Harrington Avenue southeast of Second Division Brook. It stood at the northern end of an old network of cart paths that wound south through the eastern part of Powder Mill Woods to link West Concord with the Powder Mill Road/White Pond area.
