

## BUILDING FORM

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The two parts of this one-story structure were built a decade apart, in 1912-13 and 1923. The earlier northern section, #29/31, is a deep one-story brick building with a flat roof with high parapet front. Its display windows were apparently replaced in the middle of this century, but some of the architectural trim, including a three-course brick cornice, remains.

#33, built in 1923, consists of a triangular brick front section which faces southwest at a diagonal to the street, and a clapboarded, wood-frame rear section. The brick here is the multi-hued type popular in the 1920's, and Its three-part parapet is topped by a concrete cap with scroll accents. Its display windows and entry have also been altered.

Along with #14-18 Walden Street, these two buildings are significant as the first constructed at Concord center for the automobile trade. In 1912-13 Albert Black, owner of Black's Block just to the west (#s 17-27 Walden Street,) tore down John Raymond's grain and feed store, (formerly Penniman's livery stable,) which had abutted the rear south wall of #27. In its place he built #29/31 as an automobile garage. The garage proprietors were Torrey & Vialle. The business was successful from the start, and they soon built the larger garage across the street at #14-18, keeping this building as an annex.

In 1923 the corner section, #33 Walden Street, was added, its rear section abutting a small wood-frame "horse-clipping shed", that remained from the former Penniman livery business. That building was used for a repair shop for some years, and demolished sometime between 1927 and 1942. #33 apparently functioned as the office for the Torrey & Vialle car agency, but it was also the office for Concord Center's first filling station, which had its pumps located back from the street just south of the building—hence the diagonal position of the facade. Further research will be necessary to provide information about Mr. Torrey; G. Walter Vialle, (cf. #414 Main Street,) who died in 1943, was an auto dealer here at the center for over thirty years.
