ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

In the early 1940's this building was constructed on the site of a building that ws torn down in 1934. Like #33 across the street and the long five-store block at #59-73, it blends well with some of the existing brick parapet-walled structures built here a century before. It is a high one-story gable-roofed structure with a deep one-story rear wing. Its main decorative feature is a very heavy molded wooden cornice at the front roof line. Like #33, it has a wide expanse of upper wall on the facade, appropriate for the installation of signs, etc. Although the storefronts have been replaced, they retain their configuration of polygonal display windows and recessed entries.

The first block of Main Street, today still called "the Milldam," occupies the earliest true commercial center of Concord, where by the eighteenth century a bustling trade was carried on. In 1828 the Milldam Company was incorporated by a group of local entrepreneurs. With a capital stock of \$20,000 they bought up the property on both sides of the dam, drained the pond, (which had developed great waste-disposal problems,) built a wide gravel road where the dam had stood, and sold lots for business buildings on both sides of the street. In the process, most of the former buildings were torn down; a few were moved to other locations. The Milldam Company constructed some buildings here itself; others were put up by individual owners, and several here today are later replacements. This first block of Main was called "Exchange Street" in the latter part of the nineteenth century.

Like the other late buildings at #s 33 and 59-73 Main Street, #30/32 is now old enough to be appreciated as an illustration of one type of small-scale "infill" building that was built in small town centers in the 1930's and early 1940''s, and has proved its worth as a building that functions well among the old commercial structures at Concord center.
