Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Like the 1904 municipal fire station next door, the Concord Post Office is typical of small Colonial Revival government buildings of the early twentieth century. The main building is a wide one-story symmetrical brick structure with a shallow-hipped roof topped by a tall cupola; the main entry is in the center of a large three-bay pedimented facade pavilion. All the windows are large, with multiple-light sash. The three in the center have segmental-arched openings are separated by wide brick pilasters. The other windows are rectangular, and are set into wide recessed brick panels. The pediment is flushboarded; the rooflines are trimmed with a molded wooden cornice.

The Concord Post Office was built in 1937 on what had formerly been the lawn of the George Brabrook house (see #22-28 Walden Street.) It replaced a series of small Post Offices that over the course of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries had been housed in stores and other business establishments on Main and Walden Streets.

2. Property Appearance

a. Description of General Area (Describe neighborhood, historic district, land use & direct or indirect effect upon other building of historic interest. If more space is needed, attach additional sheets.)

On one of Concord's secondary commercial streets, the Post Office is adjacent to a large 19th century wood church and a two story brick commercial structure. The sites are well landscaped with a number of large trees. Across the street are one story connected masonry storefronts lining the sidewalk, no landscape planting.

b. General Condition of Property (Site and Building)

Condition and maintanance of both the building and grounds appears to be very good.

c. Description of Building Material (Roofs, walls, foundation, interior features, floor and ceiling, etc.)

The brick exterior is trimmed in painted wood. Front steps are granite with simple iron railings and light standards. The concrete foundation is not visible on the exterior. The front roof is pitched with replacement asphalt shingles and metal ice flashing at the eaves. The lobby floor is original terrazo, wainscot is marble. Ornamental plaster is used at the cornice and ceiling. A new aluminum and glass partition divides the original lobby.

A low flight of granite steps leads up to the (replacement aluminum) entry doors. The box lobby is entered directly, with the expanded service lobby to the right and the Postmaster's Office to the left. Beyond the lobby is the expanded workroom with the mail platform and truck area to the rear.

4. Architectural Significance

Identify type, period, method of construction, artistic value, significant and distinguishable entity (See National Register criteria, 36 CFR 60.4, Criteria for Evaluation).

A pedimented 3-bay central projecting pavilion is flanked by single-bay hipped roof side wings. Wide, flat brick pilasters define the central bays, inset brick panels define the wing bays. Each main bay contains a large, segmental arched opening set in a recessed brick panel, the center opening containing the simply framed wood entrance (replacement aluminum doors). A large wood and metal louvered belfry caps the intersection of the pitched roofs. Detailing (Colonial Traditional) is kept to a minimum. The visual effect depends instead on the relationship between large-scale elements of a somewhat planer character.

5. Historical Significance

Designed in the mid 1930's, the building is typical of many built during the Depression Era. A local consulting Architect was employed, one of the Jess common Government programs, but frequently used in the early 1930's.

6. Conclusion and Recommendation

A smaller structure by Post Office standards, the building is a reflection of standard plans and exterior elevation motifs in use by the Post Office at this time. 
