

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Today a double house, this cottage was apparently first built as a single-family rental house. It is an early 1 1/2-story bungalow, actually a type of Queen Anne vernacular cottage that was prevalent in the early 1890's. It has the clapboard first story and shingled upper story typical of the later Queen Anne, and the overhanging roof with veranda beneath and hip-roofed dormers above that was coming into prominence in cottages at that time. The architectural detailing is simple and undecorated: the windows are 2-over-2-sash with unadorned surrounds, and the main entry has a glass-and-horizontal-panel door with one multi-light sidelight. The facade vernada has simple square posts, a vertical-board frieze screen, and a shingled balustrade.

This little cottage was constructed as a rental house by John M. Keyes, who owned the land on the north side of Court Lane between Monument Street and the cemetery in the 1890's. He moved the Emeline Barrett boarding house east from the corner of Monument Street to its present position at #30/32 Court Lane, building #32 Monument/50 Court Lane in its place, and had this house constructed between them. For many years at the turn of the century it was occupied by Albert W. Lee, superintendent of the new Concord Municipal Light Plant. It was later the home of Leonard C. Robinson, superintendent of the town Water Works and Sewers.
