Other features:

lst story is red brick with stringcourses of glazed brick. Upper stories are scalloped wood shingles.

2-story cruciform plan on raised basement. Hipped roof (2 intersecting). Central entrance pavilion is gabled. Quatrefoil motif in bargeboard. Deeply recessed entrance is Syrian arch of elaborate terra cotta ornament. Entrance has rough-faced red and glazed brick in checkerboard pattern. Projecting eaves supported by paired brackets.

Windows in ranges of 3's. 1st story windows have segmental arches with terra cotta ornament of owls, flowers, etc.

Land appears to have been banked up against the facade, concealing all but the tops of the arches of the basement windows. I of the 3 rear entrances has been bricked up. The rear main entrance has a door hood supported by struts.

This structure is in very deteriorated condition, with broken windows, missing shingles, and pigeon mess, detracting from its appearance.

This building meets the criteria for individual listing on the National Register as Concord's first consolidated elementary school, which effectively ended the old district school system, (Criterion A.) It also meets Criterion C as a well-preserved example of the Queen Anne and Romanesque styles of the 1880's. and of the work of architect John Faxon. It possesses integrity of design, location, setting, materials, and workmanship, feeling and association.
