#59 Elm Street is significant as one of Concord's earlier examples of a high-style Colonial Revival house. It is a two-story three-bay building with a symmetrical facade and a steep, flared hipped roof with balustraded top. A 2-story polygonal bay window is setin under the roof overhang at both facade corners. A large balconied dormer pierces the center of the front roof slope, and a smaller shed-roofed dormer appears on each side slope, each attached to a massive brick chimney.

The symmetry of the house is broken to a two-story wraparound veranda which sweeps from the center entry to the east side. It is supported on Tuscan columns, and has a spindle balustrade with urn-topped posts. The entry, a large glass-and-panel door with a sinle leaded light, is flanked by leaded sidelights and a molded surround. Most windows are 1-over-1-sash, some paired, some tripled. A vertical oval window appears over the doorway at the center of the second story.

This house was built in 1895 for one of Concord's most prominent turn-of-the-century merchants, George E. Walcott. He was a partner with S. Herbert Holden in Walcott & Holden's grocery store on Main Street, which dated back to 1848. The business had been started by George's father, Joel Walcott, who took as his partner Silas M. Holden. George took over upon his father's retirement in 1877. He was elected Selectman for several terms in the 1880's, and also served as Tax Assessor, Town Treasurer, and Water Commissioner. Mrs. Walcott was President of the Concord Women's Club in 1896. (George Walcott also owned the house at #292 Sudbury Road for a time--see Form #

The house stands on land formerly belonging to J.D. Brown, whose house still stands just to the east at #398 Main Street. After the death of his widow, Lucy Brown, their daughters sold part of the lot to George Walcott in 1895, #59 the house was built soon afterward.

George Walcott died in 1920, and was survived by his wife and three daughters, Ruth, Frances, and Esther. Mrs. Walcott appears to have rented out the house for some years, but lost the property in a bank foreclosure in 1932. In 1933 it was purchased by John W. Codding. The Codding family lived here until 1984.

As a well-preserved Colonial Revival residence #59 contributes greatly to the architectural character of the late nineteenth-century residential neighborhood in the River/Elm Street area at Concord center, and thus meets Criterion C as part of a National Register district. It also qualifies under Citerion A for its association with grocer George Walcott, one of Concord's most prominent citizens at the turn of the century.
