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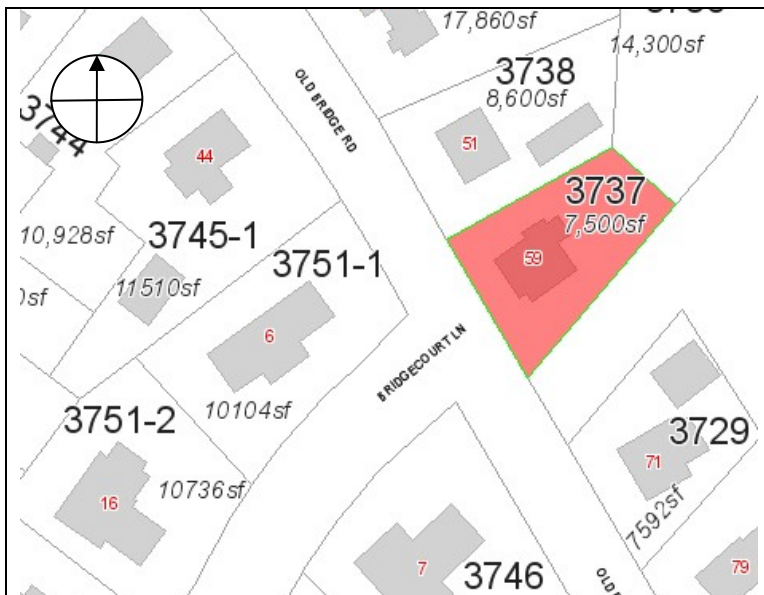

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

59 Old Bridge Road (CON.1732) is a two-and-one-half story wood-frame residence. The four-by-two bay building faces west and adopts an irregular plan on a stone and concrete foundation. The residence is set back approximately twenty feet from the street on a level lot. The building terminates in a front gable roof sheathed with asphalt shingles. One interior brick chimney pierces the east end of the north roof plan. A two-story, one-bay wide bay projects out from the north elevation of the residence. The bay is capped by a gable roof. The building is clad with synthetic shingles. A partially enclosed one-story, wrap-around porch is located on the west facade and along the north elevation. The porch is capped by a hipped roof sheathed with asphalt shingles. Access is provided by an entry located at the north end of the porch. A paired 1/1 vinyl replacement window is located to the north of the entry and a single 1/1 vinyl replacement window is located to the south. A secondary entrance is located at the east end of the porch on the north elevation. A one-story, one-car garage is located northeast of the residence. The garage is constructed of wood frame and is capped by a front gable roof sheathed with asphalt shingles. Although altered by synthetic siding and replacement windows, 59 Old Bridge Road maintains the form and fenestration of an early twentieth century residence constructed in West Concord.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

The area surrounding Old Bridge Road was developed in the late 19th century by Jeremiah Sheehan and his brother Daniel on land formerly associated with the Hosmer-Sheehan estate.

According to assessor records, 59 Old Bridge Road (CON.1732), was constructed in 1891; however the property does not appear on the 1906 map or the 1910 census. In 1921, the property is the residence of Edward W. Sheehan (b 1883) and his wife, Katheryn (b 1884) who were residing on Old Bridge Road with their children: Edward F. (b 1913); William C. (b 1914); Mary W. (b 1915); Robert E. (b 1916); Jeremiah W. (b 1917); and Joseph (b 1920). Edward worked as an assistant manager for a wholesale milk company. The 1920 census indicates that the Sheehans were residing in Watertown the previous year. The Sheehans maintained ownership of the property until 1953 when the property was purchased by Frank J. McLaughlin and Dorothy R. McLaughlin.¹ The current owner, Fern Folz purchased the property in 2008 from Kevin and Nancy McLaughlin.²
