ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION See continuation sheet

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This house is extremely significant as one of the earlier and most well-preserved of the few buildings in Concord in the Second Empire style. Built just after the Civil War, it is a stylish two-story house with a two-bay facade, connected to an elegant carriage house on the north via a complex of rear wings and ells. The structure is defined by high mansard roofs on all sections, except for a short pitch-roofed ell linking the main structure with the carriage house. The focal point of the carriage house is a high central mansard dormer; on the main house facade the eye is drawn to a later addition -- a two-story pedimented bay with a profusion of carved, bracketed, and paneled "Eastlakian" decoration, which is today highlighted by a four-color paint scheme. A high corbeled chimney in the center of the roof is typical of the Second Empire, as are the two porches, one at the main entry, the other along the north side of the main house, where square, chamfered posts, a saw-cut balustrade, and flared, solid braces contribute to the ornate character of the building. The side porch leads to a glass-and-panel door in the ell; the main facade entry is a later glass-and-panel type, with a single large light surrounded by smaller panes. (Cont.)

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

The house at #66/68 Monument Street was built in 1868 by Lorenzo Eaton (1815-1901.) He was a cabinetmaker and a furniture dealer on the milldam, in partnership with Silas Holden. In 1847 he lived at #63 Monument Street, but shortly thereafter moved to Pennsylvania. He returned sometime after 1850, moving back to the old house until he sold it to his sister, Mrs. C.O. Richardson, and built #66/68 for his new residence. He lived here with his daughters, Harriet L. and Mary S. Eaton, who inherited the house and occupied it for many years after his death in 1901. Harriet Eaton was a teacher of music for many years.

In about 1880 Mr. Eaton also bought the property just west at #78 Monument Street, which had been acquired by his sister in ca. 1871. In 1884-5 he moved an outbuilding that had stood behind #66/68 to a spot behind #78, and converted it to the double-house seen today at #27/29 Windmill Hill Road. (He was also a carriage-dealer for a while; that building was evidently used in his business as a "carriage repository.") (Cont.)

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

The windows are primarily 2-over-2-sash; there are two 6-over-1's, and a round-topped sash window in the carriage house dormer. All windows appear to have their original louvered blinds. The dormers of the principal roofs are pitch-roofed, also with 2-over-2-sash windows. A continuous line of short brackets animates the cornice at the roof lines.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

The line of lower Monument Street was altered some time in the very early part of the nineteenth century, apparently leaving an unsightly sand bank on the east side at this location. Keyes credits Mr. Eaton with greatly improving this section of the street when he graded the slope of the hill at the time he built this house.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION, cont.

A recent gift to the Concord Archives, a set of complete specifications for the building of the Lorenzo Eaton House, gives detailed information about its architecture, and sheds light on building practices for stylish houses in the Concord area in the late 1860s. The document describes such items as the dimensions and materials of the building and its timbers, the back-plastering of the outer walls and the finish plaster in the rooms, the wood gutters which were to be "wrought in the cornices," details of the architectural trim, paint, glass, hardware, and the site work. It also reveals that the architect of the building was **Hammatt Billings.**
