

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This house is one of the most stylish of Concord's many large Colonial Revival residences of the 1930's. Built in about 1934, it is a large 2 1/2-story gambrel-roofed building of largely Georgian proportions with a flushboarded facade and brick ends topped with parapet chimneys. Three pedimented dormers pierce the front plane of the roof. The house has a two-story east wing and a one-story den on the west, both nearly flat-roofed, with spindle-balustraded balconies. The windows are primarily 6-over-6-sash, with molded surrounds; some casements are located on the east wing. The main entry is a large 6-panel door with leaded sidelights and transom. It has a pedimented hood supported on fluted Doric columns. Other architectural trim includes a modillioned cornice at the roofline, and prominent quoining at the house corners.

Like many of Concord's early-twentieth-century country houses, #75 Barrett's Mill Road was built on property that was formerly part of one of the town's historic farms. In this case, it stands on six acres that was divided out from the former Theophilus Mason property, which had been farmland belonging to the Brown family of Hildreth's Corner from at least the eighteenth century. It stands directly behind the Abishai Brown House (the 'Widow Brown's Tavern' of the Revolution), which was moved into place in about 1890.

The house was built for teacher Richard Cameron and his wife Evelyn in about 1934. They owned it until 1961, when they built a second residence just to the northwest, at #111 Barrett's Mill Road, and moved there.
