

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of

other buildings within the community.

The "Warner Block" is the oldest building on the middle section of Commonwealth Ave. built for commercial purposes. The pitch-roofed, 2 1/2-story core, partially hidden by later additions, still displays its original rectangular Greco/Italianate form, brick foundation, slate roof, circular gable windows, (and some remaining 6-over-6 sash,) boxed cornice, and wide, flat corner boards and architraves.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

In many ways, the Warner Block epitomizes the development of Concord Junction. It survives as the most tangible example of how one man, Ralph Warner, shaped the community that, as "Warnerville," bore his name for over 35 years. Although he was not a Concord native, Warner's accomplishments in Concord Junction throughout the second half of the 19th century were prodigious. He operated a wooden tub and pail factory on the site of David Loring's lead works at Commonwealth Av. and Nashoba Brook from the mid 1850's to 1896, created the present shape of Warner's Pond by improving the dam, built over 20 houses and a hotel on his large landholdings, made the 1878 establishment of the State Prison at Concord possible by selling the state 47 acres of land at low cost, and donated the land for the West Concord School in 1886.

He built a small early Warnerville post office on the site of the Warner Block in the early 1870's, but in 1877 replaced it with the core of the present building, a structure that he saw as the heart of the little community. This large, 2 1/2-story structure housed, not only the post office, but stores, a lunch counter, and, before its 1897 building was constructed, the offices of the Bluine Company. On the second floor was "Warner Hall", which served as the only public gathering place in Concord Junction until a citizens' group built its rival, "Association Hall", across the street in 1891. Throughout the late 1870's, '80's, and early '90's, newly-formed chapters of fraternal

organizations, budding clubs and social groups met and celebrated here. Church services, led by visiting ministers, were held regularly in Warner's Hall, until a disagreement between Warner and the West Concord Union Religious Society led to their expulsion from the building, and the subsequent founding of the Union Church on Main St. in 1893.

In 1896, after an attempt to rebuild the pail factory business following a disastrous 1894 fire, and after bitter disagreements with local citizens, including one in which he unsuccessfully tried to prevent the change of the name of the post office from "Warnerville" to "Concord Junction," Warner sold all his West Concord holdings, including the Warner Block, to two closely-linked local real estate syndicates—the Concord Junction Land Co. and the Concord West End Land Company. With a final irony, the West End Land Co. made the Warner Block their headquarters, building the two wings that remain today, and converting Warner Hall to office space. From the building that had once been the heart of Ralph Warner's domain, the company's managers, store proprietor and postmaster Loring Fowler, and Reformatory Superintendent Joseph Scott, sold off or rented out most of the Warner real estate, and developed Warner's Pond for recreational use.
