ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

Although today altered by synthetic siding, with some accompanying loss of architectural trim, this house is still intact as a tall, two-bay, 2 1/2-story gable-end Italianate house. Typical of the style, it has two-over-two-sash windows, a polygonal bay window on the facade, and an elaborately-bracketed canopy at the main entry. The door is the single-light glass-and-panel type. The eaves are unboxed; the foundation is brick.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

This house occupies the site of what was for several years the easternmost house on the new Bedford Street, belonging to "Mrs. O'Brien." This was Mary Jane Reynolds O'Brien, widow of John O'Brien. (The original house belonged to her mother, Mrs. Reynolds, who is reputed to have been the first Irish woman to immigrate to Concord.) Mrs. O'Brien subsequently married Thomas Foley, and at one time owned both this property and #76. The O'Brien's daughter, Mary, married Edward Kelly, and in ca. 1900 the Kellys replaced the old house with the present one, moved from the site of approximately 128 Bedford Street. (The 1875 map shows a house of about these proportions on that site.) The property is still owned by family members.
