Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Like its companion next door at #69 Walden Street, #77/79 is a 2 1/2-story five-bay, one-room-deep house with a pair of rear chimneys and a projecting center lobby entrance or "porch". Its two parallel two-story rear wings were both standing by 1852; one is believed to predate the main part of the house. (See below.) The windows are 6-over-6-sash, with molded surrounds. Much of the architectural trim here is identical to that at #69, including the molded, boxed cornice without a roof overhang at the gable-ends. The main entries of both houses are in pedimented porches; the door here has shaped panels with heavy moldings, and a simple surround of recessed-paneled pilasters, with their capitals in a plain entablature.

Part of this building is believed to be the old two-story, 46-foot-square cabinet shop of carpenter Nathan Hosmer, which stood on the east side of the old Milldam (on the site of today's #33 Main Street) early in the nineteenth century. With his business failing, by 1816 Hosmer had sold the building to Deacon Jarvis, but continued to live upstairs with his young family. In 1828, when the Milldam Corporation bought most of the land there and began replacing the buildings with stores, Hosmer moved the building to the present location, where he is said to have converted it to a house. It is not clear which part of #77/79 was the old cabinet shop; it is likely that it comprises one of the two rear wings, and that the main house itself was added onto it, (possibly in 1833, for the marriage of Nathan's son Rufus and Sophia Turner.)

Three of Nathan Hosmer's sons, Rufus, Nathan, and Silas, were also builders. Both Nathan (see #69 Walden Street) and Rufus were carpenters; Silas was primarily a mason. Among Rufus Hosmer's known works was the portico and some other carpentry for the 1832 Concord Bank and insurance building at #46-48 Main Street. HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

For most of its existence #77/79 was a double-house. After Rufus Hosmer's death in 1860, his widow Sophia inherited the property, owning it until she died sometime after 1889. It belonged to her estate for several years thereafter, and was occupied by the Hosmers' daughters into the twentieth century. It was finally sold out of the family in 1934, to John Bent. Among the tenants who lived in the south side of the house in the latter part of the nineteenth century were H.L. Shattuck and, in the 1890's, the Rev. Abraham W. Jackson. Townsend Scudder lived here while working on his book, Concord, American Town, which was published in 1947.
