Although this is a somewhat altered house, it still contributes substantially to the early-nineteenth-century rural character of Nine Acre Corner. It is a 2 1/2-story five-bay structure with a pair of off-center chimneys behind the ridge. A short 2-story wing projects to the rear of the east end, connecting the main house to a long 2-story side wing. The 6-over-6-sash windows are typical of the 1820's-30's; the shallow cornice of the main house is more indicative of its ca. 1790's construction date. (The rear sections, which have a boxed, molded cornice, may be later additions.) The main entry has a four-panel door with applied moldings, full-length sidelights, and a flat, unadorned surround.

This farm began as part of the eighteenth-century Lee farm, which ran north from Lee's Bridge to Fairhaven Bay, and included the Mine Hill. (See #509 Garfield Road.) In 1790 Woodis and Isaac Lee sold to their brother Nathan Lee, "housewright, thirty acres of land with a frontage of 22 rods on the road under the mine hill." He apparently bought it to build on, for in 1799 Nathan and his wife Rebecca sold the property to James Puffer of Sudbury and Isaac Lee, who sold it at once to Joel Rice (ca. 1731-1819) of Northboro, with buildings.

In 1806 Joel Rice deeded half his farm to his son Phinehas Rice, and in 1812 the other half was mortgaged to Jonas Lee, who assigned the mortgage to Israel Rice of Sudbury, a blacksmith. In 1824 Israel Rice, then "of Concord" (indicating he may have lived in this house by then,) sold his half of the house and barn, with 15 acres of land, to John G. Brigham, Jr. J.G. Brigham was a wheelwright, who previously carried on his trade beside the milldam at Concord center. The property passed to his descendants through the middle of the twentieth century, first (by 1875) to Alonso Howe Brigham, then by 1896 to Harry W. Brigham, (see also #350 Fitchburg Turnpike,) and after 1933, George Brigham.
