

#91 Liberty Street is a 1 1/2-story "gable-end" cottage of an eclectic Victorian type. Its "clipped" front gable with scalloped verge-boarding, a variant on the Gothic Revival style, was associated in the middle years of the nineteenth century with the writings and designs of Andrew Jackson Downing and Alexander Jackson Davis. Hence this building, like the main farmhouse next door at #49 Liberty Street, is one version of a "Downing Cottage."

The main house has paired 6-over-6-sash windows. Those at the first story have a shed-roofed hood with exposed rafter-eds, as does the main entry. The two-story east wing is largely a twentieth-century addition, possibly raised from a one-story ell.

Behind the house is the largest barn in the vicinity. Actually a double barn, it consists of two cupolaed "New England" barns joined by a wide archway. Maps show two separate barns here as late as 1893; they were apparently linked by the archway shortly after that.

Liberty Street, laid out by the town in 1793, received its name in 1854. Paralleling the curves of the Concord River between Lowell Road and Monument Street, this section was flanked by farmland for many generations.

Although #91 is not shown on the map of 1875, according to J.S. Keyes it was built by his nephew, George B. Keyes, in 1865. He and his wife, Mary, were then living with her parents, Simon and Mary Brown, in the farmhouse at #49. George Keyes was by then evidently running the farm here, which filled the area bounded by Liberty Street on the south Estabrook Road on the east. At about the time he built this house, he moved the Brown barn from its position east of #49, and "the Rhodes barn," which apparently stood south of Liberty Street, up the hill to their present positions.

From about 1884 until at least 1906 the foreman was Philip Flavin. It is possible that he was related to the Philip Flavin (see #215/217 Lexington Road,) who later practiced as a dentist on the Milldam.
