



Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Although somewhat altered by the addition of a garage on the facade, #100 Garfield Road is still a good example of a typical early-twentieth-century gardener's cottage. Generally Colonial Revival in style, it has a gambrel roof with three massive ridge chimneys, and a recessed corner gable-end entry. A wide porch shelters a second entry on the south side. The windows are 8-over-1-sash, with flat surounds, and a long shallow shed-roofed dormer spans the length of the south side of the roof. The house has two parallel rear wings.

This house was formerly a gardener's cottage for the Frederick Dumaine house at #153 Garfield Road. It was built behind the Dumaine house on the east side of the road probably in about 1906 when the main house was built. In 1928 Mr. and Mrs. George P. Metcalf bought the Dumaine property, and in about 1940 the gardener's cottage was moved across the street to become a house for their son, Richard Metcalf. He remained here until the mid-1960's.
