ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

#110 Cottage St. is significant as one of the most well-preserved examples of this particular type of Four-Square in West Concord. In contrast to some of the earlier 1890's Four-Squares, such as those on Assabet Ave., Church, and Highland Sts., that are almost Greco-Italianate in their heavy proportions and wide-board or molded trim, this house displays the steep pyramidal roof with squat chimney, hip-roofed dormer, and shingled upper story that became prevalent after the turn of the century. The windows, too, are more typical of the later Four-Squares—they are 2-over-1 sash, and a square, colored-glass window with a border of rectangular panes lights the stairwell on the east side of the house. The lathe-turned columns and scroll-shaped brackets at the facade veranda are a lingering Queen Anne touch.

Complementing the house is an early 2-car, pitch-roofed, shingled garage.
