Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This house, like #94/96, its companion across Davis Court, is a typical 1870's double house. It is two stories, two rooms deep, with a pair of ridge chimneys and paired entries on the facade. The facade is generally a three-bay arrangement, as the doors are sheltered by a single projecting cornice and flanked by a 6-over-6-sash window on each side; at the second story the center window is a narrow paired 4-over-4-sash. Typical of an Italianate house, paired, sawcut bracktes adorn all the cornice lines, and the doors are glass-and-panel, with two rectangular ights. One 1-story polygonal bay window projects from the north end of the house. The cornerboards are trimmed with molded caps.

Bedford Street, called the "New" Bedford Road, was extended east of Sleepy Hollow to the Bedford line in 1854-5. This house was one of several built along the southeast side of the street in the 1870's. Its first owner was apparently "F. Clark," who also owned #118 next door. By 1885 it had been acquired by James Maguire, who lived on one side. The other was occupied in that year by tinsmith Andrew Poland.

After James Maguire's death in about 1907, his widow continued to live here. Among the tenants at that time were Nora and Patrick Carson. The house was later bought by William Fitzgerald, who died by 1929. He was survived by his widow, Alice L. Fitzgerald, who owned the property until 1945.
