

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

One of the largest early-twentieth-century houses south of Nine Acre Corner, #153 Garfield Road is a long seven-bay 2 1/2-story gambrel-roofed brick house with a two-story rear wing. A pair of tall chimneys is incorporated into each end wall, giving the building a distinctly Federal Revival appearance. The main entry, also, harks back to Federal precedents: it has a wide broken pediment supported on fluted Doric columns, and a sidelighted and fanlighted six-panel door. The windows are large 6-over-9-sash at the first story; 6-over-6-sash elsewhere. Five barrel-roofed dormers with round-topped windows project from the front plane of the roof. A glassed-in porch at the south end of the house is supported on Tuscan columns.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

In the early twentieth century many old farms in Concord were converted to country estates. This property is one of the few that did not occupy a hilltop or river-front location. It is also notable for the incorporation into the new structure of an existing house. The owner responsible for the way it looks today was Frederick C. Dumaine, who came to Concord in the early 1890's, and evidently had this house built shortly after the turn of the century. He came from the Dumaine family that was associated with the Amoskeag Mill and the Waltham Watch company, and remained here until about 1928.

There is some disagreement as to the age of the small wooden house that forms part of the south end of this structure. Ruth Wheeler implies that it was an early nineteenth-century house which belonged to farmer Silas Holden, who was born in 1789 and married Sarah Hosmer in 1813. She says that a cellar hole on the property remains from a house built in 1688 by Stephen Hosmer, and that it was the latter building that descended to Stephen, Jr. (1709-1782) and to his son Nathan, who was drowned in the Sudbury River in 1778. Jarvis mentions the Stephen Hosmer house as "an old deserted house" in ca. 1820, and Thoreau refers to it several times in his journals. (Cont.)

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HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

He refers to it as still standing in 1855, but in 1858 gives a detailed description of it as a "triangular mass of rubbish," with only the chimney and frame intact. It seems most likely, then, that it is the Silas Holden House that is incorporated into the present #153 Garfield Road, and not the Stephen Hosmer House.

After Silas Holden's death, from at least 1830 through 1856 the farm here belonged to "T. Holden," apparently his son. By 1871 it was the property of Marshall H. Holden, who owned it through at least 1896. The Dumaines lived first on Main Street, and then on Sudbury Road. They lived here from the time the new house was built until about 1928, when the property was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. George P. Metcalf.
