

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

The only important architectural features are interior components, principally decorative, which make up the fifteen period rooms housed in this Museum. None of these are structual, although some panelling is involved. The shell itself dated 1930, is not architecturally significant.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The Concord Antiquarian Museum was founded as the Concord Antiquarian Society in 1886 for the purpose of houseing and preserving historic objects in the town of Concord. Between 1886 and 1930, the collection was kept at the Reuben Brown house, a historic house in the center of Concord. In 1930, the President of the Society, Russell H. Kettell and Harry B. Little, designed and built this concrete and brick replica of a New England Georgian revival mansion house for the purpose of providing a fireproof museum for the collection. The building has remained in this role continuously since that date.
