

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

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

Although it has been substantially altered, #204 Harrington Avenue retains much of the form and detail of a small turn-of-the-century cottage. It is a two-story building with its facade in the gable end facing north toward the road, and a pair of twin gables facing east. Twin gables are unusual in Concord, and may be the result of an expansion of the building early in this century. The windows are two-over-two-sash, with molded frames. The main entry, now integrated into an enclosed porch, is also apparently the product of the early twentieth century, and lends a hint of the Colonial Revival to the house. It has a multi-light door sheltered by a gabled hood supported on Doric columns.

This little house was apparently one of the earlier small dwellings built on Harrington Avenue near the turn of the century when the road was extended west from the Wheeler/Harrington House to join with Main Street at Westvale. It may in fact have been built by the Harrington family, as records associated with that building refer to a "cottage house" that they built at about this time. (See Form #277.)
