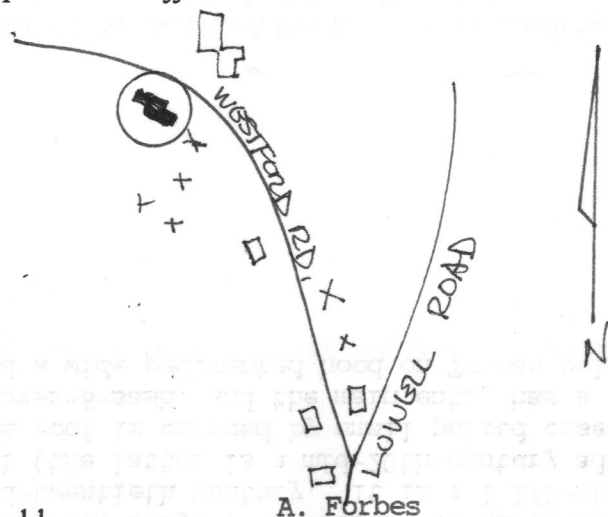

#229 Westford Road was originally a very small, simple cottage. Its size and appearance today are largely the result of an enlargement and at least one update in the mid-twentieth century. It is a 1 1/2-story three-bay house flanked by an east and west ell (the latter is a mid-20th-century addition). Its aspect today is Colonial Revival: the roof is pierced by small paired casements and an off-center chimney, the windows are 6-over-6-sash, and the main entry has a 6-panel door, full-length divided sidelights, and a wide pedimented hood on Tuscan columns and pilasters.

This house was apparently built in the 1890's as a cottage on the old Jones family farm. It belonged to Arthur C.H. Jones, a son of Hiram W. Jones of 216 Westford Road, whose farmhouse stands directly across the road. Arthur was also a farmer, and is shown here in both the atlas and street directory of 1906. The house later belonged to Russell Clark.
