



#235 is one of the smaller and simpler of the many Greek Revival houses at Concord center, but it is still one of the most stylish examples, and one of the best-preserved structures from that period on Main Street. It is a 2 1/2-story, five-bay house with pedimented ends. A short 2-story wing extends west from the southwest rear corner, with an early 1-story ell behind it. Both the facade and the east end are flush-boarded. Although built in the mid-1840's, the building continues the interior end-wall chimney arrangement seen on earlier houses in the vicinity. The facade bays are divided by wide flat pilasters, and the center entry is recessed under an unusual horizontal-board entablature. The entry has one of Concord's few examples of a Greek, Revival two-panel door, flanked by full-length sidelights. The windows on the main house are 6-over-6-sash with molded surrounds. Those on the west wing have flat surrounds with projecting, molded pediments on the first story. A pair of pitch-roofed dormers with later pierced-work verge boarding appears over the facade; a 2-story bay window projects from the rear. The architectural trim here, typical of the fully-developed Greek Revival, includes a very wide frieze with architrave and projecting, molded cornice.

This house is notable for several of its illustrious residents, many of whom made important contributions to their town. It was built in 1844 on a two-parcel lot purchased from David Loring and Sewall Belknap by the Rev. Barzillai Frost (1804-1858). He had been ordained here as an assistant to the 87-year-old Dr. Ezra Ripley of the First Parish Church in 1837, the same year that he married Elmira Stone. He succeeded Dr. Ripley as pastor upon the latter's death in 1841. According to Jarvis, "he created no enthusiasm, but he commanded the thorough respect and confidence of the people."

The Rev. Frost apparently remained officially employed by the church until his death in 1858, although he left active service in 1856. He sold the house in 1857 to William Leighton of Cambridge. Deeds show that the next owner was Moncure D. Conway of Cincinnati, a friend of Ralph Waldo Emerson, who purchased the property in 1862, and sold it the next year to Mary Jane Austin. A friend of the Alcotts, she was a novelist known also as Jane G. Austin. (Cont.)

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE, cont.

Among her very popular books were <u>The Nameless Nobleman</u>, <u>The Outpost</u>, <u>Standish of Standish</u> and other historical novels. She and her husband, <u>Loring H. Austin</u>, a businessman in Lowell, moved to Boston in the early 1870's and rented out the house; among the tenants was attorney J. Fay Barrett.

In 1881 the Austins sold the house to Charles and Mary Ann Stearns of Concord. Mr. Stearns, an invalid, died a few years later, and Mrs. Stearns lived on in the house until her death in 1896.

Charles H. Walcott bought the house, and lived his last years here. He was a lawyer and historian, and best known in town today for his <u>Concord in the Colonial Period</u>, published in 1885. While still in school he had been appointed the town librarian (1865). He was later a commissioner of the Massachusetts Board of Arbitration, vice-president of the Middlesex Institution for Savings, as well as a Justice of the Peace, chairman of the Board of Assessors (1876), selectman, (1883,) and for a short time Superintendent of Schools (1872).

Mr. Walcott died in 1901, and his wife, Jessie, (a well-known illustrator of children's stories and magazines,) died in about 1907. In 1909 her heirs sold the property to Anne H. Jewell, wife of investment banker Pliny Jewell, II. The Jewells lived here until 1922, when the house was purchased by Ethel Hutchinson, wife of Dr. Charles W. Hutchinson. Dr. Hutchinson died in 1934, and Mrs. Hutchinson remained here until 1943.

This house meets the criteria for both individual listing on the National Register as part of a district of large well-preserved buildings of the late eighteenth- to nineteenth-centuries at Concord center. For its association with Barzillai Frost, minister of the First Parish in the middle years of the nineteenth century, it meets Criterion A, and as a well-preserved example of a pilastered Greek Revival house, it meets Criterion C. It possesses integrity of design, setting, materials, and location, workmanship, feeling and association.
