

#333 is one of the simpler houses on the section of Main Street between Thoreau and Elm Streets. It is a 2 1/2-story, two-bay, side-hall-entry gable-end building of a common late-nineteenth-century vernacular type. It is almost completely devoid of any decoration. The windows are 2-over-2-sash, with molded surrounds and shutters. A pair of small pitch-roofed dormers project from the east slope of the roof. Maps indicate that the one-story polygonal bay windows on both the east and west sides were added between 1909 and 1918, and it is likely that the dormers were added at about the same time. The main architectural trim consists of a wide molded, unboxed roof overhang, and narrow unadorned trim boards at the rake, frieze, and house corners.

This house was built between 1872 and 1875 by express agent L. Willis Bean. He and his family had previously lived in the house just east at #325, which he had moved from the north side of the street, and he apparently constructed #333 on the west end of its lot. He died some time between 1905 and 1909, and his two daughters, Elizabeth, a schoolteacher, and Edith Bean, who evidently inherited the property, lived on in the house for many years.

This house meets the criteria for listing on the National Register as part of a district of well-preserved buildings of the late eighteenth- to nineteenth-centuries at Concord center. For its association with express-agent L. Willis Bean, it meets Criterion A. As an example of a nearly astylistic vernacular gable-end house, it meets Criterion C.
