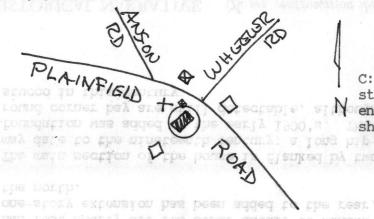

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This house, which has been altered and expanded many times, is still architecturally significant for its Federal-period core, a 2-story, hip-roofed, five-bay house with a pair of large interior rear chimneys. The building still stands on its dressed granite foundation, and it retains its narrow corner boards and molded, boxed cornice, but it has lost nearly all its other detail to window replacement and synthetic siding. A one-story extension has been added to the rear, where a 2-story modern wing extends to the north.

The main section of the house is flanked by two large wings. A high two-story west wing may date to the nineteenth century; a long hip-roofed two-story east wing on a rubble foundation was added in the early 1900's. The lines of a ca. 1890's facade veranda with round corner bay are still detectable, although it has been enclosed and sided with stucco in this century.

The Nine Acre Corner Wheelers descended from George Wheeler, one of Concord's first settlers. This house was built on part of the extensive family farm by Cyrus Wheeler in 1816. In the second half of the nineteenth century it passed to his son, Gardner Wheeler, and thence to Gardner's son Anson, who established Nine Acre Corner's reputation as a market-gardening and greenhouse region. He was a pioneer in growing cucumbers under glass, and in fact is said to have been the first farmer in Middlesex county to build a greenhouse. By 1904 he had five large greenhouses, and eventually expanded to ten. His prize greenhouse crop was rhubarb, grown in a greenhouse with a top that could be removed so that a layer of snow could fall on the plants. He eventually expanded his greenhouse cultivation to tomatoes and mint as well. (Cont.)

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

Anson's sons, Alden and Raymond inherited the farm, which by the early 1900's was employing 25 hands. Alden Wheeler, a master of farm equipment, was one of the first farmers in town to irrigate his land. He constructed a system of pipes and pumps that brought water to the farm from White Pond.

By the middle of the twentieth century, a combination of increasing competition, rising taxes and low market prices forced the reduction of farmland all over Concord. Much of the Wheeler family farm was sold for house lots in 1963, and Anson, Alden, and Raymond Roads now stand where the fields used to be.
