

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

#398 Main Street is a rare example of Second Empire residential architecture at Concord center. (See other examples at #44 Middle Street and 66 Monument Street.) It is a large, square two-story, three-bay house with a 1-story rear ell and the mansard roof that is the hallmark of the Second Empire style. The roof has shed-roofed, bracketed dormers on each side; most other windows are 2-over-2-sash with deep, heavy crowns. A paired 1-over-1 appears over the main entry, and a pair of 1-story bracketed rectangular bay windows project from the south side. The center entry has a 6-panel door with sidelights, transom, and a plain board surround. As is typical of the Second Empire, other detail here includes paneled cornerboards, sillboard, and an overhanging cornice with paired, saw-cut brackets.

Until the end of the 1880's the house lot for #398 Main Street filled all the area between Main and Elm to the Trinity Church lot and the properties along River Street. The house occupies the site of a former artisan's shop, probably the blacksmith shop built by William Badger in the 1840's (see #377 Main Street.) This house, one of the few constructed anywhere in Concord in the mid-1860's, was built for Julius M. Smith (1823-1912) after he sold his former house, then located at #252 Main Street, to Frederic Hudson. Mr. Smith had begun his career as a house painter, and had a house and store on Main Street. He sold his interest in the store in 1859, and in the 1860's he and Barzillai Hudson bought a coal and wood business from George Prescott. He also established a carriage factory south of the Fitchburg Railroad Station. He lived here at #398 for several years until he went bankrupt, whereupon he sold the house and moved in with Andrew J. Harlow (see #377 Main Street and 12 Elm Street).

The purchaser of #398 was farmer and milk dealer Joseph D. Brown, who is shown here by 1875. J.D. Brown was one of several children of J. Warren Brown, who with their mother helped operate the family farm at 1266 Lowell Road after their father died from a fall from an apple tree. (J.D.'s brother was Benjamin W. Brown-see #238 Elm Street.) Mr. Brown was elected to the town's first Board of Road Commissioners in 1871; he apparently moved to New York for a time in the early 1880's. (cont.)

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

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The house was also occupied, and later purchased or inherited, by Mr. Brown's daughter's family, the George E. Vialles. George Vialle was a teller with the Boston National Bank, and was thus one of many residents in the area who commuted to the city to work. His sons, G. Walter and Herbert Brown Vialle, also lived here after they came of age, and Herbert followed his father in the banking business. In about 1912 G. Walter Vialle, owner of a garage and car agency at Concord center, built his own house at the rear of this property, today numbered 414 Main Street. (See also #14-18, 29/31, and 33 Walden Street.)

This house meets the criteria for individual listing on the National Register and as part of a district of well-preserved buildings of the late eighteenth— to nineteenth—centuries at Concord center. As the home of two prominent businessmen and entrepreneurs, Julius M. Smith and J.D. Brown, it qualifies under Criterion A. As a well-preserved example of a Second Empire house, the only one on Main Street at Concord center, it also meets Criterion C. It possesses integrity of design, location, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association.
