

In spite of some alteration in the early twentieth century, (see page 1,) #415 Plainfield Road is extremely significant as Concord's only example of one high-style Greek Revival house-type--the 2 1/2-story building with 2-story side colonnade. The house is completely true to the type: the tall tetrastyle colonnade, of fluted Doric columns, echoes the four-bay arrangement of the flush-boarded south side, where 9-over-9-sash "long" windows appear at the first story, 6-over-6-sash at the second. The gable ends are fully pedimented, and the house trim, which includes wide corner pilasters, sill board, and a full entablature of architrave, frieze, and molded, boxed cornice, is the quintessence of the Greek Revival at its height.

A two-story pedimented wing that projects to the rear of the main house may be part of the original structure; a long 2-story wing that extends to its east would have been added at a later date. (Cont.)

Concord," this property is significant as the farmstead of an acreage that was split off from the large farm belonging early in the nineteenth century to Cyrus Wheeler. Further research will be necessary to determine the exact circumstances under which the house ws built. It appears first on the 1852 under the name of Joel Wheeler, and it is likely that it was built for him. By 1875 it belonged to "L. Miles", (possibly Levi Miles—see #170 Fitchburg Turnpike,) and by 1880 to Joel's son, Alvah G. Wheeler, who owned it until at least 1908.

Early in this century the farm was acquired by Levingston Prime. He sold it in 1927 to Floyd Verrill, whose son, Stephen Verrill, still owns it today. A new era began at Nine Acre Corner under the Verrill family ownership. Floyd Verrill established a dairy farm here that eventually, under first his management and later that of his son, Stephen, grew to have the county's largest herd of registered Holsteins (over 150) producing milk for wholesale buyers. Floyd Verrill also ran a retail milk (Cont.)

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

In spite of the addition of porches, door hoods, and the replacement of the doors early in this century, much Greek Revival detail remains. Most windows are 6-over-6-sash, with flat surrounds, and a semi-circular window graces the gable of the rear wing. The west entry retains its full-length sidelights and shallow-pedimented entablature in spite of the addition of the later door hood.

The east wing is linked via a 1-story clapboard bay to a large square orange-brick hip-roofed garage, probably built ca. 1910-15.

Old photos show that the barn to the rear, (now converted to a dwelling,) was a large "New England", cupolaed type with the wagon door in the west gable end. In ca. 1929 it was changed to a low, pitch-roofed structure, and the long cow barn added to its east. A polygonal bandstand-like pergola stood just south of the colonnade in 1908.

business, the Concord Dairy, in partnership with James de Normandie and later Farnham Smith. It delivered milk first from the Verrill's previous farm on the site of what is now the Nashawtuc Country Club and later, from 1939 until the 1950's, from the corner of Sudbury and Thoreau at Concord center. Floyd Verrill was the first of Concord's dairy farmers to pasteurize milk and the first to sell milk to the schools.

By the time Stephen Verrill took over the farm in 1957, however, most of the retail business had been phased out, with only a small portion continuing at Concord center until 1968. By 1990, a combination of changing economics and government regulations led to the end of the dairy operations here, and the Verrill's cows, the last dairy herd left in Concord, were sold at auction. The farm today continues with the presently more profitable enterprises of pick-your-own strawberries and vegetables, and general truck farming. The Verrills also maintain a smaller herd of Holsteins, largely for breeding purposes.
