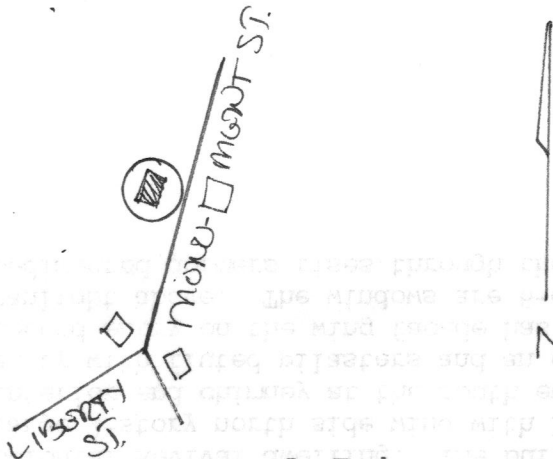

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This house is one of the later significant structures on this section of Monument Street. It is an excellent example of a large shingled early-twentieth-century Colonial Revival dwelling. The building is 2 1/2-stories, five bays wide, with a large 2-story north side wing with 1 1/2-story garage extension. It has one interior end chimney at the south end of the roof ridge and an elaborate center entry with fluted pilasters and an elaborate ogee or "swan's neck" pediment. A second entry on the wing facade has a transomed, paneled door with a semicircular fanlight above. The windows are 6-over-6-sash, with molded surrounds. A line of pedimented dormers rises through the corners of the north wing.

Further research will be necessary to determine who built this house, which is one of several built on sections of the old Monument Street farms in the early part of this century. Street lists indicate that in the 1930's it may have been occupied by a family named Park.
