ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This house is characteristic of much of the residential architecture constructed in Concord in the 1930's. Generally Federal Revival in style, it is a two-story hip-roofed building with a central chimney. It is clad in the wide clapboards popular at the time, and has a sidelighted entry with a louvered elliptical fanlight that is clearly based on precedents of the Federal period. The facade is four bays wide at the second story, three at the first. The windows, which have molded surrounds, include 6-over-6- and 9-over-6-sash, and a pair of tripartite windows flanking the main entry on the facade.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

In the early twentieth century, building lots were divided out from much of the remaining open land near the town center. The stretch of Lowell Road between Hildreth's Corner and Liberty Street saw only a few houses built between 1900 and 1940, of which #536 is the latest. Further research will be required to determine for whom it was built, but it was undoubtedly sited to take advantage of the view over Macone's Pond.
