

#### **BUILDING FORM**

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION  $\square$  see continuation sheet Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This house is highly significant as one of Concord's Federal period "brick-enders". Characteristic of its construction date, it is a late period example of the 2-story, five-bay, shallow-hip-roofed Federal house with tall corner chimneys that was popular in Concord from the 1790's through the 1810's. A long two-story clapboarded rear wing extends to the north. The center entry of the main, south-facing facade has a semi-circular fanlight and a broken triangular pediment. A second entry on the east side is sheltered by a later porch on square posts. The windows are 6-over-6-sash, with molded surrounds and louvered blinds.

Ruth Wheeler has corrected some mistakes in the order of ownership of this house given by Keyes, although two of her accounts conflict somewhat with each other. Although in her "Concord House File Mo 12" she says the house was built about 1820 by Edward Wright, later research apparently convinced her that the house was built by Edward's father, Jonathan Wright (1759-1817.) In 1791 he had bought the old farm here, (part of the original Flint grant,) and by the time of his death in 1817 he had built this "new house," which he willed to Edward along with 69 acres and the old Flint farmhouse to the north.

Edward Wright married Mary Hunt. A farmer who raised broom corn and made brooms on the property, he died in 1825 at the age of 36. Edward and Mary's son, George W. Wright, left Concord to become an early settler of California; he was later the first representative of California to Congress.

After her husband's death Mary Wright sold the old farmhouse to Jonas Monroe (see Form #BX), and this "new" house and the southern part of the farm were acquired by Capt. Nathan Barrett (see also Form #BZ). He owned it only briefly before selling it to (Cont.)

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

Gen. Joshua Buttrick, who was for many years the highest officer in the Concord Artillery. He is shown here in 1830; his widow still owned the house in 1852. By 1856, however, #577 had been purchased by Henry L. Shattuck. Henry Shattuck (d. 1892), son of Daniel S. and nephew of Lemuel, served for many years as Concord's Superintendent of Public Grounds. He sold the house to Capt. Richard Barrett in 1868.

Richard Barrett was one of the town's most influential citizens of the second half of the nineteenth century. In 1864 he succeeded his father, Capt. Joseph Barrett, as secretary-treasurer of the Middlesex Mutual Fire Insurance Company on Monument Square; he also served as Justice of the Peace. He had attained the rank of Captain in the US Volunteers during the Civil War. Like many proprietors of Concord's large farms in his day, he turned the acreage here into a progressive and successful operation, noted for its vineyard and its heavy crops of hay and vegetables. The story goes that he bought a thousand-dollar piece of land across the street, and paid for it in the first year in a crop of cucumbers.

After Richard Barrett's death in 1887, a sizeable farming operation was apparently run here for a few years by George R. and Nellie Gay as tenant farmers. In 1890-1891 the property was purchased by Judge Henry C. Merwin, associate judge of the District Court, and his wife, formerly of Lowell Road. Judge Merwin, who was also an author, is said to have turned the acreage farm into a breeding farm for both horses and dogs. The Merwins retained ownership of the farm until 1898. The property was subsequently purchased by I. Pierce Sewell, a leader in the Christian Science Church. He owned it until at least 1941; it was later owned by James Howe Volkmann.
