



Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This little house has been so altered that its original appearance is only a matter of speculation. Today it is mainly significant for its striking mansard roof. It is a two-story, three-bay building, one-room-deep, with a central projection on the facade, and 2-over-2-sash windows. The main entry, visible through the center of a 20th-century enclosed porch, is a wide double-leaf glass-and-panel door of ca. 1860's vintage. The architectural trim includes narrow cornerboards and solid saw-cut brackets at the house corners.

Although this house is best known for its very brief association with the Alcott family, its main significance in the context of the town as a whole has to do with the Hosmer family. An old house was standing on the site in 1740, when it was acquired by Thomas Hosmer, Jr. It eventually fell to his son Benjamin, who was to see action as a Minuteman on April 19, 1775, at the North Bridge. Benjamin's wife Sarah died during the smallpox epidemic of 1792 at the time of the birth of their first child. Burial for smallpox victims in the public cemeteries was frowned upon at that time, and both mother and baby are buried some distance behind the house in a grave marked by a table tablet. It is said that the family horse and wagon that carried them there are buried with them.

Benjamin Hosmer and his sister Dinah lived in the old house until they were quite elderly. In 1820 the house was replaced, apparently by other Hosmer family members, who may have incorporated part of the former structure into the new building. Benjamin and Dinah lived in the new house until they died-Dinah in 1831 at the age of 90, and Benjamin in 1832 at 82. (Cont.)

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

The succession of ownership after that is not clear, but it was still referred to as "the Hosmer Cottage" when Bronson Alcott and his family came to live here in 1840. This was their first residence in Concord, and they stayed here three years, before relocating to Harvard for their brief utopian experiment at Fruitlands. Their youngest child, May, was born here, and Louisa Alcott as a child wrote her first poem here at the age of eight. She later used the Hosmer Cottage as the model for the "Dovecote," in <u>Little Women</u>, the first house where Meg and her husband John set up housekeeping.

Maps indicate that by 1852 the house belonged to J.F. Barrett, probably Jonathan Fay Barrett, who evidently rented it out. By 1871 it was the property of Charles S. Callender; his widow is still shown as the owner in 1889. In 1893 a Mrs. Cook was living here, and in 1906 the owner was artist Robertson James, who owned several pieces of real estate at the center. By the late 1930's it was owned and occupied by John H. Loftus and his family.
