ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This house is unique in the Hildreth Corner area as the neighborhood's only example of an early twentieth-century double house. It is a large 2 1/2-story building with a pair of ridge chimneys. A two-story rear wing with a one-story extension behind it abuts the rear of the house. The facade is four bays wide, with paired entries, each with a single-light glass-and-panel door. A shallow-pitched gable rises over the center of the facade; the roof profile is animated by a pronounced "kick" at the eaves. What appears to be the only remaining original window here is a 6-over-6-sash on the facade. The cornice is boxed, with returns on the gable ends.

#709-711 Lowell Road was built by Nellie Worthley, a teacher in the Concord schools. She was the daughter of farmer Hiram Worthley (see #648 Lowell Road). Part of the house was occupied for a time by her brother, Arthur B. Worthley.
