

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DESCRIPTION: A one story hipped roof restaurant. The entrance side has a rank of fifteen sash windows and a small pedimented portico clad in the same horizontal painted wood siding as the rest of the structure. Above the entrance portico is a small billboard. The hipped roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The rear of the building has several extensions which house storage rooms and parts of the kitchen. The restaurant is surrounded on three sides with a paved parking area, and is set back over 100' from the road.

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

A building unique in Concord, this low one-story, hip-roofed restaurant is representative of one type of roadside restaurant built to serve automobile travelers in the 1920's. The beveled "drop" siding is typical of the era, as is the long band of 6-over-1-sash windows across the facade. A massive interior brick chimney pierces the eastern end of the roof ridge.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

Although it stands on the "Battle Road" of April 19, 1775, as a roadside gathering place the 1927 Willow Pond Kitchen has taken on its own significance as the town's earliest twentieth-century resource of the automobile era. It is nationally known as a Concord landmark of a character unique within this very historic town.

Like the Howard Johnson's Restaurant built a decade later at the opposite end of town on Route 2 and Elm Street, this restaurant is only one of two surviving examples in Concord of a restaurant/roadhouse catering to the automobile traveler at a time when roadside resources were few and far between. It began as a summer clam shack, which was converted by James McManus into an ice cream parlor. In about 1945-47, after being closed for a few years, the property was bought by Ross Ransom, who had run a bakery in Carlisle during World War II. He winterized the building, and moved a garage from the front of the building to the rear. He named it the Willow Pond Kitchen after a pond at the town boundary between Concord and Carlisle. Under Mr. Ransom it was a true roadhouse, functioning as both a restaurant and a barroom. His living quarters were in the east end of the building.

The property is now owned by the National Park Service as part of its 750+-acre Minuteman National Park. The interior was partially damaged by a fire in 1963. BIBLIOGRAPHY and/or REFERENCES
