

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This little house, though radically altered by the its conversion from a barn and the recent addition of two modern ells, still contributes some late-nineteenth-century character to the Hildreth Corner area. Moved south from #856 in the 1940's, today it is a three-bay building with a narrow central chimney and small 6-over-6-sash windows with unadorned surrounds. Three small pitch-roofed, through-cornice dormers rise from the facade plane. The architectural trim includes a molded cornice, but no roof overhang, either at the eaves or the gable-ends.

This building illustrates one common type of twentieth-century building conversion—the transformation of a former outbuilding into a dwelling. In this case it was the barn which had stood beside the Dana B. Clark House at #856 Lowell Road until the late 1930's or 1940's, when it was moved to this site by Benjamin Clark and repositioned on what appear to be the granite cap—stones of its former foundation.
