Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

#972 Monument Street is a square, two-story hip-roofed house which faces south, with its side to the road. It has a non-symmetrical three-bay facade with a pedimented entry vestibule. A one-story balconied sunroom projects from the east end. The windows are 6-over-1-sash. It is clad, not with clapboards, but with one of the novelty wood sidings that were frequently used in the 1920's and '30's. Its two-car, hip-roofed garage has the wood "drop siding" that is also typical of the era.

Further research will be necessary to determine who built this house, which is one of several built overlooking the Concord River in the early part of this century. Street lists indicate that in the 1930's it may have been occupied by sales manager Everett Pert and his wife Marion.
