

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This house shows a combination of styles, resulting from construction at several different periods, that is common to many buildings in Concord. Part of the house, at least, dates to the late eighteenth century. The building today, however, a 2 1/2-story, five-bay structure with a pair of narrow stove chimneys at the center of the roof ridge, is more characteristic of the second half of the nineteenth century. Its brick foundation, in fact, would indicate a date of ca. 1875-90. Other features consistent with a ca. 1880 construction date include the windows--2-over-2-sash, and one polygonal bay on the facade, the narrow corner boards combined with a molded and boxed cornice, and the design of both the main entries: the center facade entry has a glass-and-panel door with two long rectangular lights, topped by a deeply-projecting, elaborately bracketed Italianate canopy. A door in the west end is four-panel with applied moldings, and has a simpler bracketed canopy.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

Some part of this house was apparently built late in the eighteenth century for farmer Nathaniel Hosmer, who owned a large tract of land at Nine Acre Corner. Some of it was probably part of the acreage acquired by his grandfather, Stephen Hosmer, in 1731.

Nathaniel's son Amos Hosmer, who married in 1776 and may have enlarged the building at about that time, inherited the property. (Amos Hosmer was a Lieutenant with the third Regiment of Militia during the Revolution.) His daughter Betsey married Ebenezer Conant in 1812, and the house and part of the farm passed to them after her parents' death. They had eight children, several of whom continued to live here till they died; the last daughter was still living here well after the turn of the twentieth century.

Maps show Ebenezer Conant as the owner through at least 1856, and his sons Cyrus and Darius Conant as joint owners in 1875 and 1889. Darius was here until 1906. Cyrus Conant was a member of the School Committee in 1865.

Eliza and Emily Conant survived their brothers, and were here until at least 1913. some time after their deaths the property was acquired by Francis B. Maguire.
