

This unusual building is a long one-story combined cottage and outbuilding. Most of the building is a storage structure, which appears to have been used for wood and wagon storage, and possibly for housing animals as well. The roof of the western, residential section extends forward over a long porch on square posts. The building is severely plain, with only the exposed rafter ends of the roof adding an element of decoration. Much of the rear wall is fieldstone, adding to the rustic quality of the structure. Most of the doors are of the turn-of-the-century vertical-board utilitarian type; the door of the cottage has a four-pane light in the upper
