

#### ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

1651 Main Street (CON.473) is a one-and-one-half story wood-frame Gothic Revival style residence. The three-bay wide building faces north and is set back approximately fifteen feet from the edge of Main Street. The lots slopes down away from Main Street exposing the brick foundation of the side and rear elevations. The residence is capped by a front gable roof sheathed with asphalt shingles. Typical of the Gothic Revival style, the gable features decorative vergeboards and is capped by a wood finial. Interior brick chimney pierce the east and west roof planes; one on each side. The residence is clad with painted wood clapboards. Access is provided by an entry centrally located on the north facade. A bracketed gable roof hood is located above the entry. Like the roof of the main block, the gable roof of the entry hood features decorative vergeboards and is capped by a wood finial. A single 1/1 replacement window is located to each side. There are four window opening on the east elevation and two on the west. All windows are twentieth century replacements. A bracketed shed roof caps each window opening. Although altered by replacement windows, 1651 Main Street maintains the form and details of a mid-nineteenth century Gothic Revival residence.

#### **HISTORICAL NARRATIVE**

The Gothic Revival style was typically constructed between 1840 and 1880. The Gothic Revival residence at 1651 Main Street (CON.473) is first identified on the 1875 map as property of E.C. Damon; however properties do appear in the area on the 1852 map. Edward Damon (1836-1901) was born in Concord, the son of Calvin Carver Damon (1805-1854) and Rebecca Poor Farnham (1808-1882). After his father's death in 1854, Edward took over control of the Damon Mill at which had been under his father's control since 1834 when he purchased the mill from James Derby . The Damon mill was destroyed by fire in 1862 and replaced that same year by the extant Italianate brick mill (CON.479; CON.DX; NR listed 1979) designed by Elbridge Boyden of Worcester. Edward was very active in the local community; school committee, the library committee, Board of Selectmen, a trustee of the Middlesex Institution for Savings, to name a few.

While it is likely that the property was built by Edward Damon, head of the Damon Manufacturing Company ca. 1862-1864 during the period of rebuilding at the Damon mill after a fire in 1862, it may have been constructed a few years earlier. 1651 Main Street was likely used as a rental property by the Damon family who were residing in the late nineteenth century at 1641-1645 Main Street (CON.471), the home of his gather, Calvin C. Damon. 1880 Census records do not indicate house numbers and with the large number of mill employees residing in the area at this time, it is difficult to determine who may have been residing in this house at the time. It appears from deed research that the property was owned by the Damon family until 1943. Between 1943 and 1993, the property was owned by Roger S. and Ruth H. Carter. In 1993, the current owner James A. MaCaulay purchased the property.

Although altered by replacement windows, 1651 Main Street maintains the form and details of a mid-nineteenth century Gothic Revival. The residence possesses a high degree of integrity of design, setting and workmanship. The property meets criterion A and C at the local level and would be a contributing property in a potential Damon Mill Historic District. The potential historic district would include the Damon Mill, the store, workers housing along Water Street and Main Street as well as several Damon family homes in the neighborhood.



ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

One of West Concord's very few buildings with Gothic Revival

features, this long, pitched-roofed, gable-front, wood-frame house is 1 1/2 stories at the front, 2 1/2 at the rear. Pierced, sawtoothed verge boards remain at the facade and center entry hood, which is supported by pierced brackets. Other Gothic Revival trim includes a slim spindle finial at the front end of the roof ridge, and solid-bracketed window hoods on the facade. The front entry door is paneled, with two round-headed, rectangular lights.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

Important as the only house in the Gothic Revival style in West Concord, #1657 belonged to the Damon family by the early 1870's.
