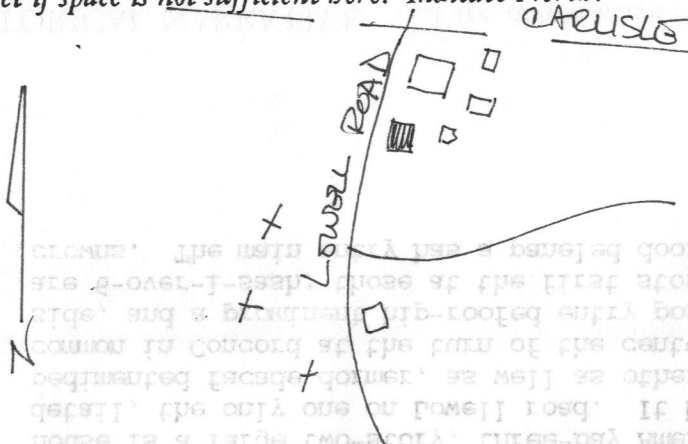

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

The last house in Concord at the north end of Lowell Road, #1764 retains much of its feeling as an early-twentieth-century farmstead in the midst of encroaching new development. It sits back from the road beside a stone-lined mill race or irrigation ditch, opposite a meadow, with several outbuildings to its rear. The house is a large two-story, three-bay American Four-Square with Colonial Revival detail, the only one on Lowell road. It has the ashlar foundation and the pedimented facade dormer, as well as other typically Colonial Revival features common in Concord at the turn of the century, a polygonal bay window on the south side, and a prominent hip-roofed entry porch on paired Tuscan columns. The windows are 6-over-1-sash; those at the first story are paired, with dentilated, molded crowns. The main entry has a paneled door flanked by sidelights.
