

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

1450 Main Street (CON.1397) is a two- story wood frame residence. The building adopts a rectangular plan on a fieldstone foundation. The four-by-two bay building faces south and is setback approximately two hundred fifty feet from the edge of the street on a gently sloping lot. Mature evergreens and deciduous trees partially obscure the facade from the street. A concrete and cobblestone stair is located to the southeast of the residence and provides access to the residence from the lower front lawn. The building terminates in a side gable roof sheathed with asphalt shingles. An interior brick chimney pierces the ridge of the roof. The residence is clad with vinvl siding. Access to the residence is provided by an entry located at the east end of the elevation. The opening is protected by a pedimented gable roof supported by slender wood posts. A contemporary one-story sun-room bay projects out from the south elevation to the west of the entry porch. A large picture window is located to the west of the sunroom. The second floor of the south facade features four 6/1 double-hung vinvl replacement windows. A secondary entrance marked by a one-story entry porch is located on the east elevation. A one-story addition is located on the west elevation. The addition is capped by a shallow pitched hipped roof.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state) history. Include uses of the building, and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

The previous architectural survey of 1450 Main Street stated that the existing building is the converted carriage house¹ of the Abiel H. Chase House at 1440 Main Street (CON.1396). The Abiel Chase Carriage House at 1450 Main Street (CON.1397) was constructed ca. 1880 for farmer, Abiel H. Chase (b. 1835) and his wife, Martha (b. 1841). Abiel and Martha resided at 1440 Main Street (CON.1396) through the early part of the twentieth century with their children Edith (b. 1879) and Frederick (b. 1870).

Historic maps indicate that an outbuilding associated with the Abiel H. Chase House was located on the property to the west of the residence as early as 1889 and again in 1906. The Sanborn Map of 1918 indicates that a small one and one-half story automobile garage is located to the west of the residence. The garage is still located to the west of the residence in 1947. Assessor records indicate that the current building was constructed in 1947 which would have been shortly after Daniel and Rita Hayes purchased this property and the property of the residence from Abiel and Martha Chase's daughter, Edith.² Interior investigations are warranted to determine if portions of a carriage house or garage remain within the existing house. The Hayes family continues to own the property in 2013.3 A discussion with the current owners may also provide answers to the original use and construction period of the existing two-story building.
