ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION *(continued)*

The Concord Monument Square Revolutionary War Resources Historic District includes those properties associated with the American Revolution which flank Monument Square.

The Colonial Inn (MHC 298) is divided into three sections. East Section: Built before 1716. Two story, two rear chimney, 5 bay, mansard roofed and dormered house in Second Empire style. This section was updated to it's present appearance in the 1860s. The façade is decorated with a wide band between the floors and four square pilasters. A deep canopy embellishes the door. The center section dates to 1775, with the second story and the hipped roof added in 1800. This section is five bays wide with a full length porch supported by fluted Doric columns. The chimney is along the ridge line and reads "1716". The first floor is clad in flush planking, while the second is clapboard. The corner boards have molded capitals, and a wide frieze with a molded box cornice surmounts the wall. West Section: Two story hipped roofed house with a symmetrical façade. This portion was built between 1812 and 1820. The mansard roofed, 2 story entry pavilion was added in 1860. The second story of this building is clad in flush planking with Corinthian unfluted pilasters and a molded cornice with modillions. There is a central arched window in the second floor. The door is surrounded by unfluted tapered pilasters.

The Reuben Brown House (MHC 312) is a 2.5 story, gable roofed, 5 bay house. The roof is broken by a center brick chimney, and a modern rear shed dormer, and is covered with asphalt shingles. The main body is clad in narrow clapboards with scarf joints. The windows are modern 12 over 12 lights set into projecting, molded casings. A projecting entryway flanks the door with fluted pilasters and flush planking. The side door in the west end has a transom. A modern triple window is located in the east gable end. Stone, brick, and concrete foundation. A 2 story shed roofed addition runs the length of the rear of the house and a 1 story addition is attached to the east gable end. The house is on a small lot with a narrow front yard between it and Lexington Road. It is directly south of the Fiske House.

The Fiske House (MHC 311) is a 2.5 story house with a seven bay front and a gable roof. The southern two bays of the house appear to be an addition to the original house which had a centered entry and behind the ridge brick chimney. The southern section has a true gable roof, while the northern end is a salt box roof. The entire roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The structure is covered in clapboards with corner boards, and is generally unadorned. The entryway is enclosed with a hipped roof and side lights. The windows are 6 over 6 with plain frames. The placement of windows in the gable end is asymmetrical. The foundation is of dressed stone.

The Wright Tavern (MHC 329) is a 2.5 story double hipped (mansard) roofed, 5 bay by 4 bay structure in the center of Concord. The roof is clad in asphalt shingles and is pierced by two tall internal, rear, brick chimneys, and a forward, central brick chimney. Similarly, two peaked, 6 over 6 light dormers are located in the east and west roof lines. Modern gutters are attached to the roof. The main body of the tavern is clad in clapboard siding. The front (north) façade has a central door flanked by two windows on either side. The door is surrounded by a classical pediment and pilasters. The east door has a simpler cornice and pilaster treatment, and is flanked by a single window to the north and two windows to the south. All of the windows in the house block are 9 over 9 light and have external shutters. The foundation is stone. The tavern is currently occupied by an antiques store (basement), an architect, and the First Parish Spiritual Renewal center. First Parish Church is to the southeast and the common is to the west.

The Concord Monument Square – Lexington Road Historic District is significant for its involvement with the events of April 19, 1775. The four structures: Wright's Tavern, the Colonial Inn, The Bulkeley-Brown House, and the Fiske House, in the district are associated with the Battle but were not actively involved in the fighting that took place. Consequently, they are included in the district rather than in the battle proper. Similarly, the Wright Tavern and the First Parish Church were treated as separate Associated Historic Properties.

In 1747 Ephraim Jones acquired the property and built what is now known as Wright's Tavern. He then sold the tavern to Thomas Munroe in 1751. Munroe ran the hostelry until his death in 1766, during this period the town selectmen held their meetings in the tavern. After this the building passed to Daniel Taylor. Then sometime, not long before March 1775, Amos Wright either purchased or rented the tavern. It is more likely that he simply rented the space because in December 1775 Taylor sold the property to Samuel Swan. Thus, the man who's name is historically associated with the structure likely never owned the structure, and lived there for no more than a year. However, it was during Wright's tenure that the most significant events took place in the tavern. Little is known about Wright, aside from the fact that he married twice and is generally listed as a laborer or a school teacher, rather than an inn keeper. Regardless, he was the proprietor on April 19, 1775. That day, upon hearing the alarm bells, the Concord men mustered on the green and used the tavern as their headquarters while they sorted out the reports of the approaching British. It was to this site that Captain Smith and the Lincoln troops reported to as well. Eventually, the gathered mass of Americans withdrew from town to the Muster Field leaving the tavern vacant for the British to occupy. Colonel Francis Smith of the 10th British Regulars (the leader of the expedition) established his headquarters in Wright's Tavern once the British had occupied Concord Square. There are no known accounts of the actual events that transpired in the Tavern during the British occupation, but there is an oft repeated story of a British officer (Major Pitcairn is traditionally indicated, but it was more likely another officer or Smith himself) stirring his toddy (brandy, sugar, and water) with his finger and remarking that he would similarly stir Yankee (or Rebel) blood before night fall. Regardless of the drama, the tavern served as the command center for the British as they sent men out to seize the stores at Colonel James Barrett's Farm, engaged in the skirmish at North Bridge, and eventually decided to withdraw from town initiating the running battle that took them back to Charlestown Neck.

Besides these happenings, the tavern was associated with insurrectionary events before the war even began. On October 11, 1774 three hundred delegates from Massachusetts gathered at the First Parish Church for a Provincial Congress with the expressed intent of coming "together to maintain the rights of the people" (Boston Historic Sites Commission 1958:123). During the five day session a number of the committees spilled over into the adjacent hostelry for their meetings.

Following the Revolution, Swan ceased to tend the tavern and by 1793 it was in the hands of Francis Jarvis who used the basement as his bakery. In 1831 the building was again sold and was rented out as a domicile, a store, and a bakery at various times. Eventually Reuben Price and Judge Hoar purchased the site in 1880 and in 1886 gifted it to the First Parish. The First Parish continues to own it today.

The Colonial Inn, which at the time of the battle consisted of only the eastern and central portions, was used as a storage depot by the Americans at the time of the battle. The stores kept here were no doubt some of those that Colonel James Barrett, the superintendent of supplies for the Massachusetts Committee of Safety, hid amongst his neighbors. The most likely location for these stores was the recently erected central section of the Colonial Inn. There are no reports of the

British seizing these goods, despite the fact that they used the center of Concord as their headquarters immediately previous to the Concord fight. This section later became a store owned by Revolutionary War veteran John White. The eastern section of the Inn was the home of Dr. Timothy Minot, Jr. at the time of the battle and was where some of the soldiers wounded in the skirmishing at North Bridge and elsewhere were brought for medical attention after the battle moved eastward. The third, western portion of the Inn was built between 1812 and 1820, and the three sections appear to have had different owners throughout their lives until Daniel Shattuck succeeded in gaining title to all three in 1839. The three structures became the Colonial Inn in 1897 and have been operated as such ever since. A recent Massachusetts Historical Commission Inventory form contains a chain of title for this building.

The Fiske House and the Bulkeley-Brown House are associated with the actions of Reuben Brown leading up to and subsequent to the Lexington and Concord battle. The Bulkeley-Brown House was built ca. 1720 and passed from Henry Gould to Reuben Brown in 1773. Brown, a saddler, operated a shop in an adjacent lot. The Fiske House has been built out of that shop. Brown like many other artisans used his skills to help produce war materials for the approaching conflict. He made cartridge boxes, holsters, belts, and other necessary leather goods for the troops. On the day of the battle Colonel Buttrick dispatched Brown to scout at Lexington. Brown returned reporting that the British had fired on the Lexington men, sending the Concord militia and minutemen into full preparation. Upon their retreat the British pillaged Brown's shop and set fire, perhaps accidentally (this and the town house are the only two buildings touched by fire on the 19th), to his property. The fire was extinguished before it damaged the buildings. A British officer, Lieutenant Patter, was held prisoner briefly in the shop building. After Lexington and Concord Brown opted not to serve in the army, hiring a substitute each time he was drafted, and instead engaged in the more lucrative business of supplying leather goods to the Continental Army. This decision transformed him from being in danger of being run out of town for debts in 1770 to being one of the wealthiest men Concord in 1780. Since the Revolution the Brown House has been sold a number of times and has been the home of the Concord Antiquarian Society (1886-1930), a restaurant (1930-1946), an apartment building (1946-1954), and is once again a single family home. A recent Massachusetts Historical Commission Inventory form acts as a chain of title on this structure.

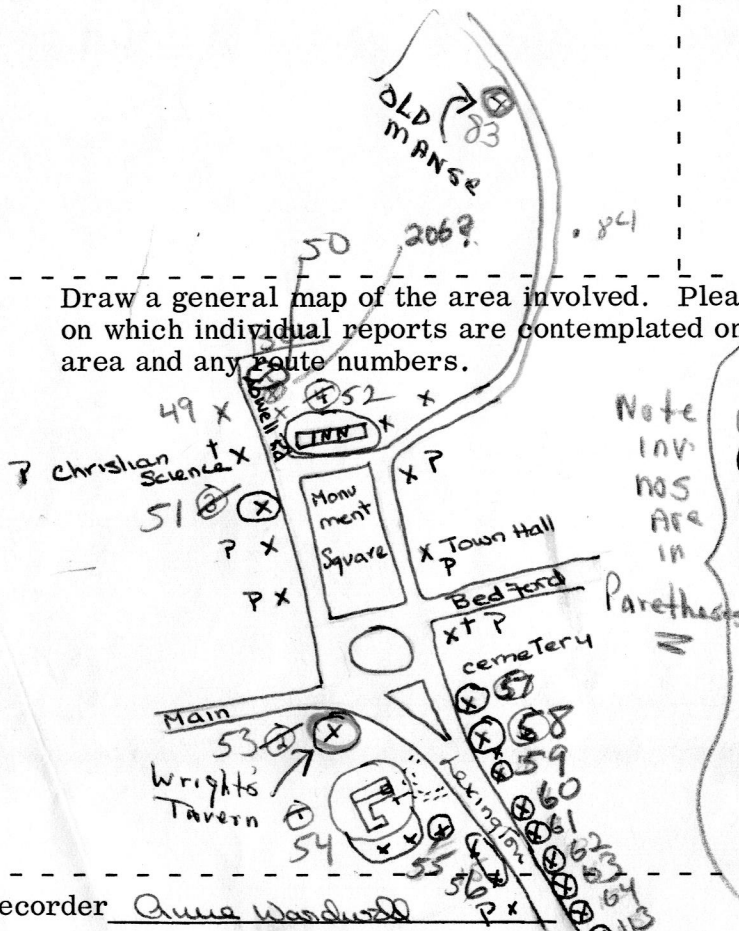
