Describe architectural, structural and landscape features and evaluate in terms of other areas within the community.

These two buildings, though altered, still contribute substantially to the nineteenth-century rural character of sections of Cambridge Turnpike. #423 is a two-story cottage, its main section gable-end to the street, with a long cross-gabled, two-part section extending to the east. A facade porch on heavy square posts ties all three parts of the house together. The windows are 6-over-6-sash, with molded surrounds. #417, standing down off the road just west of #423, is also two stories. Its proportions suggest that it was converted from a barn, and its 6-over-1-sash windows, characteristic of the turn of the century, may indicate that it was renovated in about 1900.

Explain historical development of the area. Discuss how this area relates to the historical development of the community.

The date and ownership of these two houses is difficult to verify by map evidence, as only the main farmhouses of Cambridge Turnpike are shown on the atlas maps. The map of 1906, however, shows what appears to be a small cottage in about this location. It is likely that #423 is the cottage that Keyes refers to as a small house built by Charles Tuttle (of #383 Cambridge Turnpike, just west) for his farmhands. This type of accessory cottage was commonly found on Concord's larger farms, and many of them still exist along the town's outlying roads. The proportions of #417 suggest that it may have originally been a barn on the Tuttle farm.
