

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural, structural and landscape features and evaluate in terms of other areas within the community.

Perched on a low hill overlooking Spencer Brook west of Lowell Road is one of Concord's largest and most dramatic country houses of the 1930's. This property is also important as the town's only example of a large estate, complete with walled gate and gatekeeper's cottage, designed by Harry Little. (See #263 Simon Willard Road.)

The Brooks Stevens property consists of 87 acres of land on the west side of Lowell Road, extending to the widest area of Spencer Brook. A high brick wall along the road has two large gates; beside the main one is a square hip-roofed stucco gatehouse in the French Provincial style (#1079 Lowell Road.) Notable features of this building, which appear at Little's other French Provincial houses at 712 Monument Street and 256 Simon Willard Road, include high belt-coursing on the wall and a pilastered chimney. The windows are a combination of 9-over-9-sash and casements; the main entry is a 6-panel door with fluted pilasters and medalioned cornerblocks, in a projecting vestibule. (Cont.)

This magnificent estate, designed by architect Harry Little in 1936, was built for Brooks Stevens, Jr. (1902-1981), and his family. He was a successful manufacturer with interests in both the United States and Canada. He also held various directorships and offices in the U.S., Canada, and Great Britain.

Two gatehouses were originally planned for this property, but only one was built.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE, cont.

The main house is set deep into the property at the end of a long drive flanked by lawns and meadows. The drive ends at the rear of the house in a courtyard enclosed by the same type of high brick wall as that along the stret. The house itself is a hybrid combination of French and Colonial Revival, with the latter style predominating. It is a large two-story, five-bay hip-roofed structure flanked by a pair of side wings. Each side wing has a one-story flat-roofed rear extension--that on the east contains a two-car garage, the one on the west is living space; it has a spindle-balustraded around the roof. The main entry from the drive has an 8-panel door topped by an elaborate entablature of broken triangular pediment with urn finial, and in the frieze, a carved floral swag. A semi-circular Doric entrance portico adds to the ceremonial effect. The south facade, which overlooks a wide sweep of terraced lawns and formal gardens, is more complex. At the center is a wide arched portico (a later addition) with fluted Doric columns. To its west is a two-story projection with iron grillwork supports, and on the west wing, a large Palladian window. Other fenestration in the house includes 6-over-9-sash, 12-over-12's at the first story, 6-over-6's at the second, and Casement French doors on the south facade. As in the gatehouse, the architectural trim here features molded belt-coursing, but also includes a modillioned cornice, quoined corners, and spindle balustrades. Small dormers pierce the main roof, and massive corbeled chimneys rise from each section of the house.
