ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of

other streetscapes within the community.

The three wood-frame houses on Pine St., just off Main, were originally identical to each other, showing one more variation on the 1 1/2-story, gable-front workers' cottage theme that appeared during the same period on Grove St., Barrett's Mill Rd. and Crest St. The facades of these houses, like those on Grove and Crest St.s, are a 2-bay arrangement with a rectangular bay window sheltered by a veranda roof that extends the full width of the facade. In contrast to all the other groups, however, these three houses were built with a second veranda along one side, which ended at a 1-story rear ell. The original configuration stll exists at #15. All have granite block foundations; #21 retains a double-leaf entry door, a lathe-turned column at the entry porch, and decorative shingle under the facade gable.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain historical importance of streetscape and how the streetscape relates to the development of the community.

This group of houses, constructed on parts of two lots purchased by prison-store owners Isaac Flagg & George Russell in 1891, was probably constructed by them as rental housing for Boston Harness Co. workers. BHC employees occupied all three cottages well into the 20th century, illustrating that company's need for workers' housing outside of the Harness Shop village area.
